Condemns President Trump for administration's decision to terminate Temporary Protected Status designation for Haitian nationals.

1 **AN ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION** condemning President Donald J.  
2 Trump for his administration’s decision to terminate Temporary  
3 Protected Status designation for Haitian nationals.  
4  
5 **WHEREAS**, On January 12, 2010, the Republic of Haiti was  
6 devastated by a magnitude 7.0 earthquake and was subsequently  
7 struck by aftershocks that measured as magnitude 5.9 and 5.5,  
8 respectively; and  
9 **WHEREAS**, The government of the Republic of Haiti estimates that  
10 300,000 people died as a result of the earthquake; and  
11 **WHEREAS**, Economists estimate the total direct economic damage  
12 from the earthquake to be higher than that nation’s entire gross  
13 domestic product, and may reach as high as \$13.9 billion; and  
14 **WHEREAS**, On January 21, 2010, the United States Secretary of  
15 Homeland Security granted Temporary Protected Status (TPS) to  
16 Haitian nationals in the United States due to the conditions in  
17 Haiti; and  
18 **WHEREAS**, Haiti has suffered additional loss of life and damage to  
19 essential infrastructure from Hurricanes Matthew and Irma in  
20 2016 and 2017, respectively; and  
21 **WHEREAS**, There are approximately 75,476 people of Haitian  
22 ancestry who reside in the State of New Jersey, who make  
23 significant contributions to the cultural and economic diversity  
24 of the State, and who have integrated Haitian TPS holders into  
25 their families and communities; and  
26 **WHEREAS**, Approximately 3,400 Haitian nationals present in this  
27 State are TPS holders, and there are 1,100 children in New  
28 Jersey who were born in the United States to Haitian TPS  
29 holders; and  
30 **WHEREAS**, TPS holders are net contributors to the United States  
31 and New Jersey economies, and federal law prohibits TPS  
32 holders from receiving most forms of federal and state public  
33 assistance; and  
34 **WHEREAS**, The Haitian community in the United States also  
35 provides remittances to families and communities in Haiti that  
36 strengthen and support the Haitian economy as it continues to  
37 recover from devastating natural disasters, at no cost to United  
38 States taxpayers; and  
39 **WHEREAS**, The Haitian community in the United States provided  
40 remittances to Haiti totaling \$1.43 billion in 2016, equaling over  
41 18 percent of Haiti’s entire gross domestic product that year; and  
42 **WHEREAS**, The money sent from the United States to the Haiti in  
43 2016 totaled 60 percent of all remittances received in Haiti in  
44 that year; and  
45 **WHEREAS**, At a conference of the United Nations and the  
46 Caribbean Community in New York, the United States, the  
47 wealthiest nation in the world, pledged a mere \$4.3 million, out

1 of the total \$2 billion pledged, to help rebuild Caribbean nations  
2 that were devastated by hurricanes in 2017; and  
3 **WHEREAS**, At that same conference, Haiti, the poorest nation in the  
4 Western Hemisphere, pledged \$250,000 in a show of solidarity  
5 with the broader international community in its efforts to help  
6 rebuild Caribbean nations after natural disasters; and  
7 **WHEREAS**, As a world and regional leader, the United States has a  
8 moral obligation to do more to help rebuild families and  
9 communities that were destroyed by natural disasters; and  
10 **WHEREAS**, On November 20, 2017, Acting United States Secretary  
11 of Homeland Security, Elaine Duke announced her decision to  
12 terminate the TPS designation for Haitian nationals despite the  
13 requests of the Haitian government to maintain Haiti's TPS  
14 designation; and  
15 **WHEREAS**, It is in the economic interest and the foreign policy  
16 interest of the United States to allow Haitian TPS holders to  
17 remain in the United States so that they can continue to provide  
18 for their families and communities in Haiti and here in the  
19 United States, including those families with children born in the  
20 United States to Haitian TPS holders; now, therefore,

21  
22 **BE IT RESOLVED** by the General Assembly of the State of New  
23 Jersey:

25 1. The General Assembly condemns President Donald J. Trump  
26 for his administration's decision to terminate the Temporary  
27 Protected Status designation for nationals of the Caribbean nation  
28 of Haiti, who make innumerable contributions to their families and  
29 communities here in the United States and in the Republic of Haiti.  
30  
31 2. Copies of this resolution, as filed with the Secretary of State,  
32 shall be transmitted by the Clerk of the General Assembly to the  
33 President of the United States, the United States Secretary of  
34 Homeland Security, and each member of Congress elected from this  
35 State.

38 **STATEMENT**

40 This resolution condemns President Donald J. Trump for his  
41 administration's decision to terminate the Temporary Protected  
42 Status (TPS) designation for nationals of the Caribbean nation of  
43 Haiti.  
44 The Republic of Haiti is continuing its efforts to recover from  
45 multiple natural disasters that have impacted the country since  
46 2010, and the country's government has requested that the United  
47 States maintain TPS for Haitian nationals. There are approximately  
48 3,400 Haitian nationals present in New Jersey under a TPS

1 designation who contribute to their families and communities in  
2 New Jersey and in Haiti. The families of those Haitian TPS holders  
3 include 1,100 children who were born in the United States. It is in  
4 the economic and foreign policy interests of the United States, to  
5 allow Haitian TPS holders to remain in the United States so that  
6 they can continue to provide for their families and communities in  
7 the Republic of Haiti and here in the United States.
